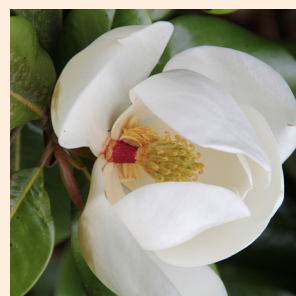
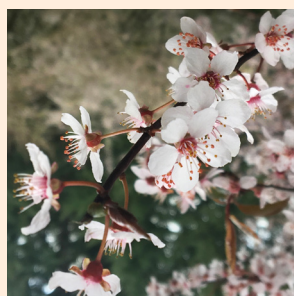


ARBORETUM FEATURES

- 1** Visitor Center: Visitor information, restrooms and drinking fountains, gift shop, classroom, and herbarium. Visitor Center courtyard features an alpine rock garden.
- 2** Overlook Trail: Accessible paved trail. Leads from Visitor Center to Washington Park MAX Station.
- 3** Viewpoint of Mount St. Helens
- 4** Winter Garden
- 5** Magnolia Collection
- 6** Maple Collection
- 7** Vietnam Veterans Memorial
- 8** Wildwood Trail: The famous Wildwood Trail starts in Hoyt Arboretum and extends 30 miles through Forest Park
- 9** Stevens Pavilion: A-frame picnic shelter available for rentals
- 10** Bamboo Forest
- 11** Conifer Collection
- 12** Bristlecone Pine Trail: Accessible paved trail featuring Hoyt Arboretum's Geographic Collection
- 13** Stone Circle Viewpoint available for rentals
- 14** Redwood Deck: Located in a beautiful Redwood Grove, the Redwood Deck is available for rentals
- 15** Dawn Redwood: A living fossil, the Dawn Redwood is Hoyt Arboretum's most famous tree
- 16** Wedding Meadow: Secluded meadow available for rentals
- 17** Native Woodland: 85 acres of the Arboretum are maintained as a natural area

For an enjoyable visit and to make the Arboretum a safe place for all visitors, plants, and wildlife, please follow these guidelines:

- Bikes, scooters, and skateboards must remain on roads.
- Dogs must always be on leash; pet waste must be removed immediately.
- The Arboretum is smoke and tobacco free; alcohol at permitted events only.
- To protect Hoyt's trees, no tree climbing, hammocks, or slacklines.
- No foraging; leave plants, animals, and other natural features for all visitors to enjoy.
- No fires, camping, or drones.

If your interest is in a specific family of trees, look for the collections. Tree collections are organized by taxonomy (plant families) and geography. There are over 100 collections in the Arboretum. Look for featured collections (in white) on the map and look for plant labels on the trees as you explore.

FEATURED COLLECTIONS

Explore the diversity of Hoyt's collection including deciduous trees and conifers, open meadows, deep forests, as well as Hoyt's nationally-accredited Maple Collection. This loop features a visit to the Arboretum's beautiful viewpoint of Mount St. Helens.

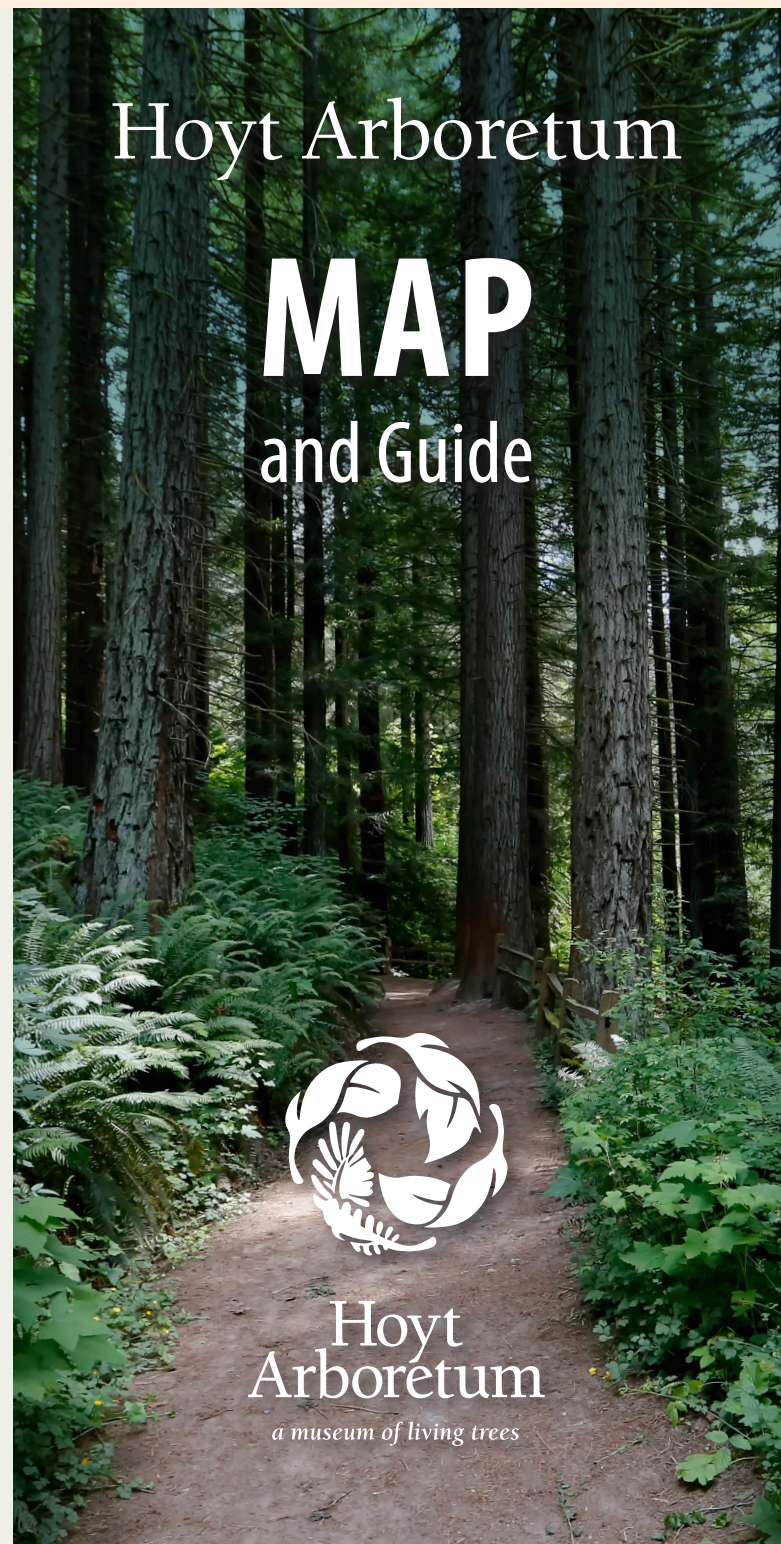


Few places on Earth can grow the diversity of trees you will see at Hoyt Arboretum. Hoyt's unique collection features more than 6,000 plants and trees representing more than 2,000 species and cultivars from around the world, including many that are rare or endangered. Hoyt Arboretum's Conifer, Magnolia, and Maple Collections are nationally-accredited for their excellence.

Founded in 1928 to conserve endangered species and educate the community, Hoyt Arboretum

covers 189 ridge-top acres in Washington Park and is on the traditional land of the Atfalati, Chinook, and Cowlitz people.

Explore the Arboretum's 12 miles of trails year-round. As seasons change, you can enjoy a new experience on every visit. Along the trails, look for interpretive panels that describe featured collections, or access Hoyt's online plant inventory at hoytarboretum.gardenexplorer.org to look up a specific tree or plant.
